SUPPORT HAM RADIO — VOTE FOR BILL!

As you know, this Branch has frequently voiced its dissatisfaction at the way certain things have been done by Council. Consequently, when vacancies on Council have to be filled, it behoves all of us to vote for those persons who we expect will act in the best interests of Amateur Radio.

OM Bill Browne, ZS2BY, kindly agreed to stand as our Branch's candidate for Council and a very brief description of his qualifications and experience appears in the booklet that came with your January RADIO ZS. To do justice to Bill's vast qualifications — all relevant to the job of SARL Councillor — would fill this Newsletter. Suffice it to say, I can think of nobody better suited to represent Ham Radio on Council.

The rear page of the aforementioned booklet, which also contains the list of motions for the AGM, is your ballot paper. Please remove it carefully and vote for not more than four candidates to serve you on Council for the next three years. To help you, we have enclosed with QSX a stamped, addressed envelope in which you can post your ballot paper back to SARL Headquarters in Johannesburg.

Being remote from the Transvaal you

are perhaps, like most of us, in the dark about the other candidates. It may help, therefore, if I mention that the Highveld Branch generally seems to hold views parallel to ours. In fact, they have even submitted a motion very much on the lines of one of ours.

Two members of that Branch are also standing as candidates, namely Lionel Rowley ZS6ALA (the Chairman) and Abe Zwiegelaar ZS6ZS/ZS1ZS. They, therefore, get my second and third votes.

For my fourth candidate I have selected Laurence Devereux ZS5DL who, as Editor of the Durban Branch newsletter CQ, has the courage to speak out on matters that are of concern to his readers.

But whoever else you select, please give Bill Browne one of your votes in the true interests of Ham Radio.

As a Councillor, of course, Bill will not be a representative of the PE Branch! Councillors are appointed to their position in their personal capacities with responsibilities towards the whole wide spectrum of League opinion. Good ones will not allow their branch allegiances to interfere with these responsibilities.

BRANCH REPEATERS

DECISIONS SOUGHT AT FEBRUARY MEETING

BY THE CHAIRMAN

In recent times, many members have raised valid questions about our Branch repeaters and some have put forward proposals for the improvement and rationalisation of our network. It is probably true that, over the years, our repeaters have tended to be erected on an ad hoc basis and there is a fair amount of overlapping. While some repeaters are no longer used to any worthwhile extent, new needs have arisen in other areas and the time is perhaps ripe for a meaningful review of our repeater policy.

Branch repeaters are provided for you, the members, and the Committee feels that the members themselves (preferably regular users of the facilities) should have the final say on the matter by a majority decision.

At its January meeting, attended also by members of the Repeater Working Group (RWG), your Committee hammered out the following general proposals for discussion and, where necessary, voting on at the February General Meeting:

General considerations

- 1. Need for links to Cape Town, East London and the North
- 2. Repeaters to cover current "shadow" areas (e.g. Uitenhage/Despatch)
- 3. General upgrading
- 4. Maintenance and
- 5. Recurrent costs of repeaters (licences, power, spares, maintenance).

Priorities recommended

- 1. Provide a repeater to serve the Uitenhage-Despatch area (the licence application was submitted to Headquarters some time ago but is still pending)
- Liaise with East London on the possibility of linking between Port Elizabeth and that City, with which we have close HAMNET ties and our members in general have a strong community of interest
- 3. Meanwhile, upgrade Lady's Slip-

- per generally but also in preparation for its rôle as backbone for the links on UHF to the East, West and North as may be necessary
- Upgrade Grahamstown repeater in readiness for linking to East London and, if necessary, Lady's Slipper
- Link Kareedouw with Lady's Slipper (but not beyond to Cape Town at this stage)
- 6. Link to Cape Town to be left in abeyance for future decision since our mutual interests are not as great as those with East London, while linking could result in blocking the whole route even for 'local' QSO's along the route
- 7. Unless the members consider it preferable to dismantle or move it (e.g. for Uitenhage/Despatch), the Cockscomb repeater may be left where it is for the time being even though it is very difficult to reach for maintenance and so rarely used that it hardly justifies the cost of its licence.
- 8. Although the University repeater is also little used, it serves as a back-up to the Town facility for HAMNET purposes and could

perhaps be included in the link to East London. It should therefore be left in situ. However, its audio quality requires attention.

Miscellaneous Proposals and Comments

- That, as requested by the donors, monies collected for the Branch Repeater Fund be used only for the upgrading of the repeater system.
- 2. That a site offered to us at Paardekop be evaluated as a possible optimum site to serve not only Uitenhage/Despatchbut also other desired areas. From reports received, the site should cover the route to the North and much or all of the area that the Cockscomb repeater can cover, and a much wider area than the Signal Hill site originally selected for the Uitenhage repeater.
- That the Repeater Working Group consult with the Committee before purchasing any materials as the goods may be available free of charge through or from members.
- 4. That decisions regarding the siting of Branch repeaters, as well as the prior authorisation of expenditure in respect thereof, be obtained from the Committee.
- That the RWG embark on a project to manufacture 2m duplexers - Wolf ZS2WG to head up this long-term project.
- That the assistance offered by several local communications technicians be drawn upon in the maintenace of the repeater network.
- The appointment of Dudley ZR2RD to the RWG was confirmed.

Since the aforementioned committee meeting, the following proposals have been received, which can also be discussed and voted upon at the meeting:

- 1. That two or more Committee members carry out tests from the Paardekop site to establish whether it can provide satisfactory coverage for the Uitenhage-Despatch area; also to establish that there are no pitfalls in connection with the installation and maintenance of a repeater at that site.
- 2. That two or more repeater maintenance teams be formed, each being alloted specific repeaters for their attention. Trevor and Christopher have found that last-minute decisions, e.g. whether to undertake or cancel a maintenance trip in uncertain weather conditions. can be made more easily if the team is small. On the other hand, it is essential for flexibility that other members develop maintenance expertise that can only be obtained from hands-on experience.
- That a group of committee members be appointed to conduct an in-depth study of our whole repeater situation and to make recommendations for the improvement and rationalisation of our network.

None of the above proposals will detrimentally affect the facilities offered by our repeater network at present but, in the long term, we can expect to save money and effort through rationalisation and orderly future development of our facilities. Please study these thoughts before the meeting so that discussion can be kept brief and to the point, and that firm and wise decisions can be made in your own best interests.

SAREX EXCITEMENT BUILDING UP

IN PART FROM RADIO FUN, JANUARY 1993

With the news that Mission STS-55 is now scheduled to talk to scholars at the Westering High School on Sunday evening, 28 February, our local team is getting into high gear. They have been collecting all the items that will be required to assure the scholars of communication quality second to none in their chats with the astronauts.

The Port Elizabeth ground station will be erected at the Westering High School, and you are invited to get along there and watch the four young people put their questions to the hams aboard Columbia.

STS-55 will be the first SAREX flight for 1993 and the second flight of the German Spacelab module. The mission will include both U.S. and German astrohams, and they will participate in worldwide preplanned as well as random contacts.

The US hams are the commander, Steve Nagel N5RAW and Jerry Ross N5SCW, both veterans of the STS-37 mission. Steve has previously had flights on Discovery, Challenger and Atlantis, and was the first astronaut to fly as a mission specialist, pilot and commander. Jerry has also flown on three shuttle missions already, and performed space walks on two of them.

Both German payload specialists are also licensed. They are Hans Schlegel DG1KIH and Ulrich Walter DG1KIM. The other US astronauts on the flight will be pilot Tom Hendrix and mission specialists Charles Precourt and Dr. Bernie Harris.

This mission will fly in a 28,5° orbit, which will bring it close to our latitude of about 34° and so we should have solid copy during the few minutes that the shuttle is between horizons — provided other stations on the ground observe radio silence on the channels so as not to cause interference to the astronauts. We appeal to everyone to show consideration in this respect — the astronauts will be able to hear signals from all over South Africa whereas we can hear only the spacecraft and purely local stations on that frequency.

Split-frequency operation will be used throughout the mission. The shuttle will

transmit (downlink) on 145,550 for voice as well as packet, while only the following frequencies should be used for the uplink: VOICE - 144,910 144,930 144,950 144,970 and 144,990 MHz; PACKET: 144,490 MHz. NOTE— If the launch is delayed such that the shuttle will be aloft during the ARRL International DX Phone contest (March 6-7), the shuttle will use only the following uplink frequencies for voice during the entire mission: 144,490 and 144,470 MHz. DO NOT TRANSMIT ON THE DOWN-LINK FREOUENCY!

Current plans call for two sets of ham transceivers on the nine-day mission: the German hardware, with an external antenna mounted on the rear of the Spacelab module, and the standard SAREX C (packet and voice) configuration within the shuttle's crew cabin, using the windowmounted antenna. The SAREX team hopes to be permitted to connect up to the external antenna, however, since it has much better performance. On the other hand, SAREX operations from the Spacelab module would be limited to voice only, using self-contained battery packs for power.

Back on Earth, the High School in Port Elizabeth will be linked to Johannesburg and thence to Mission Control in the United States by telephone lines for overall control and co-ordination purposes, remembering that we are not the only city to be involved with the Shuttle during its flight — other schools, in Swaziland and Kenya to name but two countries in Southern Africa, will also make contact with the astro-hams.





Early Thursday morning, 7th January, I set off for my usual annual jaunt to the Ciskei, popping in to see Phil, ZS2PP and Pam on the way. I arrived in Hamburg at midday and met up with Peter, ZS2ABF who had come from East London to join me on the DXpedition. We soon had our station on the air from the caravan park, with the usual FI7B and a dipole for the 40m, 20m, 15m and 10m bands.

During the antenna raising, we discovered that the gentleman by the name of Bismark, who used to be in charge of the caravan park, had been replaced by his cousin, Henceforth. Henceforth, Henceforth will be in charge there. [And whereas he's riding the creat of the wave, his appointment by the "big guns" came as a broadside for Bismark. It really sank him — just when he thought it was all plain sailing ahead - Ed.]

As a holiday, the expedition was excellent, though short. Thursday and Friday were very hot, sunny days and Peter and I spent the time operating, chatting, swimming and going for walks. As a DXpedition, it was a lot less successful due to poor conditions. Between Peter, who used his own call of S42ABF, and myself we made only 82 contacts. The only good period was Friday evening when I made 21 contacts in about an hour, almost half my total contacts for the expedition. We contacted some 32 countries on five continents, the sixth one eluding us despite hearing and calling several stations there. Twenty metres was the best band with 70% of my contacts made on that band.

Well, we have no doubt gladdened the hearts of at least some DXers and it was a nice break from home for us both. It was a pleasure to meet and spend some time with Peter.

I have been attacked and stabbed in East London, had stones thrown at my vehicle outside Komga. The worst that has happened to me in Transkei is being called a white racist by a drunk."

Glen adds, however, that driving during the night hours is a no no because of cattle and other animals on the roads. The coastal areas are peaceful and tranquil and not as is unfortunately implied in press reports. He travels through to East London regularly and travelling "reps" stay over at his Hotel daily.


They are also showing the way with their activity on the air and have arranged a weekly net on 145,400 every Thursday evening, starting at 8pm. Again, all invited to participate.
