Morse disappearing from the high seas

Morse code will disappear from the high seas as of March 1, 1999. This is the date when all passenger ships and cargo ships over 300 gross tons will no longer be permitted to use Morse code for distress calls.

The International Maritime Organization says that Morse is being phased out because of its many drawbacks. These include the need for years of training and practice for operators to use it. The IMO says that, if something happened to the radio operator, it is unlikely that anyone else on board a ship would be able to use the telegraphy equipment. The IMO says also that other reasons for the phase-out of terrestrial CW include reception problems, uncertainty about the accuracy of messages received using Morse and the airwave congestion that came with the development of radio on land.

Wired magazine reports that the use of the Morse code in maritime communications will be taken over by a network of geostationary communication satellites. Two are positioned over the Atlantic Ocean and one each over the Indian and Pacific Oceans.

Also, larger cargo ships and passenger liners will be required to carry satellite emergency position indicating radio beacon transmitters. Using these in conjunction with orbital search and rescue satellites can bring aid a lot more quickly to a stricken vessel than listening in the noise for an SOS signal in Morse code.

☐ Wonder if they heard about the Oceanos – it had a lot of highfalutin' satellite equipment, but the ship listed too badly to point to their chosen satellite and they had to use CW to shout for help!

G'TOWN REPEATER WOES

Most regular users of the Eastern Cape's famed linked repeater system will be aware of the crackling that has often been heard of late. In a visit to the installation recently, Chris ZS2AAW found that the noise occurred on a signal at the repeater input when RF was applied to the colinear antenna. It was relaved over the whole network,

Tests with a temporary quarter-wave antenna proved that the fault was in the colinear antenna itself, and not in the feedline or connections. The colinear was brought back to PE for attention and has probably been reinstalled at the repeater site by the time this issue of QSX reaches you.

During the visit, Chris also replaced the UHF equipment on the link to East London to convert the operation from split-frequency single-frequency to mode. This will enable users at the East London end to break in more easily. since they will not have to wait for a tail elsewhere on the system to drop out before they can 'turn the repeater around'

Unfortunately, Murphy was on site and the transmitter was found to have zero output. Quickly re-installing the original unit, Chris hoped that the EL chaps had not yet replaced their end with matching split-frequency UHF equipment. They had, however, so the link to EL remained unusable until Chris could get a working unit back up there.

Another reason for the UHF channel change was to accommodate a future 9600 baud packet backbone between Port Elizabeth and Grahamstown rose switch. This will provide the rural packeteers with better comms with ZSONTP and, at a future date, enable East London to access 7S0NTP as well.

DTMF installed а Chris also controller at Grahamstown to enable the VHF repeater to be removed from and restored to the linked repeater system, leaving the rest of the link to EL unaffected. The code is 7500 followed by # to disconnect and * to reconnect. removed from the link. a 'local' as continues to function Ω repeater.

CAN YOU HELP OUR YOUNG OPS?

Nicolas Thomas ZR2NDT, Chairman of the Newton Amateur Radio Club, tells us that the lads at Newton Technical High have negotiated a dedicated room (the projection room) for their radio activities. In the past a room in the electrical workshop was used but it restricted access for non electrical students. They also anticipated problems with all and sundry fiddling with their equipment.

To help them get started they are looking for transformers - 220V/15V. approx 180 VA for power supplies. 24V transformers will also do as they can remove some of the windings to get the secondary voltage down.

They also appeal for any unused PRC261 ex military sets for three of the hams at the school. These sets are crystalled up for a few channels in the 6m band and at 1/3 Watt only draw approx 250mA - ideal for them to start on with very little cost.

A Variable Power Bench Supply with Current Limiting

f you are at all interested in electronic home construction you would require a voltage source and if this source could be varied and stable it would be ideal.

Some time ago Mike Morgan furnished an article explaining the use of the L200 as an effective NiCad charger. This got me thinking about something I had read, where this device was used as a voltage and current regulator in a bench supply.

As far as can be ascertained the

specs are 3 to 30 volts at 2 amps. This is well within the requirement of 90% of homebrew projects.

In order to protect both itself and the circuit it is connected to, it is essential that some form of current limiting is applied. The L200 can limit from 10mA to 2A.

COMPONENTS

R1 1k C1 4700mfd. 50v R2 1k C2 220n polyester VR1 10k wirewound C3 100n polyester VR2 50k wirewound C4 47mfd, 50v On/off switch. 500ma, fuse and holder.

D1-D4 diodes or diode bridge to handle 2 Amps

D5 Red LED

Veroboard (about 2,5" x 1", or 65mm x 25mm)

Transformer: between 15 and 20 volts. (Remember that when the DC is smoothed by C1 the voltage increases by 1,4 times.)

One could increase the current handling capacity by using this unit to drive a 2N3055 with resultant changes in current limiting. With a 2N3055 gain of say 20 the current limiting would be 200mA to whatever the 2N3055 can

give.

With this modification (see Figure 3) one would have to increase the transformer VA rating, the size of C1 to about 10000 μ Fd and the diodes or bridge to about 6 amps.








WORLD'S OLDEST HAM DIES

Australia's and, by all accounts, the World's oldest amateur, Harry Angel VK4HA, became a silent key on 16 August at the age of 106.

Harry had been a ham for 63 years and an active Dxer until his 100th birthday, preferring the ragchew to the '10 second QSO'.

SARL BUILDING

The SARL has accumulated nearly R250 000 in its building fund and expects the construction of phase 1 of the HQ building to start soon. A 30 year lease for use of the property was signed by Sentech and the SARL recently.

Another R50 000 is required if the first and second phases of the building are to be completed in one project. A number of

pledges have been made but are still outstanding, and the League appeals to all who have promised contributions to the fund to send their remittances as soon as possible.

PEARS INITIATING NEW SA CONTEST

A new national VHF/UHF contest has been conjured up by Mike Bosch ZS2FM and the Society has agreed to adopt it as a PEARS event.

Greatly simplified rules have been put in place to level the playing fields and move the goalposts to where they can be reached more or less equally by all players, no matter what their location is in South Africa.

There is also a category to empower those entering at grass-roots level - i.e. the disadvantaged hams with low-power, FM-only rigs - to qualify for an award at the end of the day - or weekend, to be more precise.

Seriously. Moreover, the best time of the year for long-distance VHF/UHF contacts has been selected, with the great possibility of good 'openings' producing some really exciting QSOs.

More details will be announced as the time approaches.

SUNDAY OUTING TO PLET

It is proposed to arrange an outing for all hams along the Eastern and Southern Cape early in November — either the first or second Sunday (1 or 8 November). The intention is to gather for a day of ragchewing and braaiing at the farm of Roger Davis ZS1J a few kilometres west of Plettenberg Bay.

The proposal will be raised at the September meeting of PEARS.

Both of these members have given many years of support to the Club and its fore-runner, the East London Branch of the SARL. Both served for many years on the Committee and, if memory serves me well, had various terms as Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively. They certainly deserve the honour, and PEARS congratulates them.

WIN CONTESTS WITH COURTESY?

Encouraging listeners to participate in the recent SARL CW contest, an SARL bulletin urged inexperienced operators to "listen to the experts. You'll hear some slick operators...and you'll hear some operating practices that you will definitely not want to emulate."

That's very true! The advice continues: "Learn from the courteous and efficient operators, and you'll see how your own operating style changes for the better."

Which gives rise to the question – do contests encourage inconsiderate operating? Do some operators deliberately drive their rigs into distortion to cause splatter for others?

At best, contests give participants experience in copying one another under conditions of serious interference, so there is a positive side. And, of course, they bring many operators out of the mothballs into which they seem to creep between contests!

WORLD AMATEUR RADIO DAY

World Amateur Radio Day will be celebrated on 19 September. The event will honour the first two-way trans-oceanic amateur radio contact made on 27 November 1923 between French station 8AB and American stations 1MO and 1XAM on a frequency around 2,7 MHz.

These contacts were soon followed by many others and the activity ushered in the short-wave era. The rest is history, and for some absorbing further insight into this fascinating time in the development of our hobby, be sure to read Mike Bosch ZS2FM's article VHF-UHF-SHF in the October issue of Radio ZS.

A special event station using the call sign GB100AR will operate from the RSGB Headquarters in the UK on 19 September to celebrate both 100 years of amateur radio and the first trans-oceanic two-way contact 75 years ago.

Sunday Bulletins

PEARS bulletins are transmitted on Sundays immediately after the SARL English transmission, i.e. at about 08:45, on 7098 kHz as well as the 2 metre linked network that provides coverage from East London to George and environs via the linked repeater system described above. PEARS' 7098 or 3640 kHz transceive facilities are also remotely linked as needed. In addition, the SARL's 40m transmissions on 7082 or 7066 kHz, alternatively 7070 kHz, can be remotely patched into the 2m network, either in receive-only mode or for full transceive capability for interactive events.
