HAMNET/ECARES NEWS

NATIONAL EMERGENCY ALARM RADIO SYSTEM: NEAR

The NEAR system and its associated Disaster Management channels were planned to provide a much wider service for Essential Services communications for TLCs in underdeveloped areas.

It is concerned with flood reporting and control, fire reporting and control and general essential services of TLCs and District Councils.

This called for a re-organization of the DM channels and their use. The band plan appears at Annexure A. The dividing line between the Eastern and Western zones of the Eastern Cape is 28°E longitude

Farmers and rural householders use only Ch 40 for calling and 41 and 42 for general working.

SAPS stations will stand by on Ch 45 (67,125 MHz) for calls from other users. SAPS may make contact with private users by calling them on Ch 40 (67,000 MHz) and then moving to Ch 45 or a channel nominated by the called party as a working channel.

In the western zone, Ch 46 (67,150 MHz) is used solely by Western District Council Disaster Management. In the Eastern zone this channel is used by single frequency repeaters at Port St. Johns and the Wild Coast District Council.

Commandos use Chs 47, 48, 49 and 50 for their own command and control. Members of the Commandos may equip their private licensed NEARNET radios with the channels in use in their area. Users who are *not*

members of the Commandos may *not* do so. The Commando is responsible for the orderly use of these channels.

It is stressed that Chs 40-46 are designated for Disaster Management use in whatever manner the DM authorities decide in a particular emergency.

These channels are *not* solely 'farm channels' as some believe. Farmers and rural householders should use only Chs 41 and 42 for roll calls and the like, after alerting their members on Ch 40

Ch 44 is designated for use in aeronautical search, rescue and relief operations as well as fire and flood relief co-ordination.

Radio Amateurs: As requested by SAPS, these persons have agreed to assist with communications during emergencies to a greater extent than heretofore. In order to interface between amateurs (HAMNET and ECARES), official NEAR radios have been placed with selected members.

They will stand by on Ch 40, on which the SAPS will alert them, whereafter they move to Ch 45 to communicate with SAPS. As these radios are inder military control as their property, they need not be licensed as private radios.

Note: The allocation of Ch 45 as a SAPS standby and working channel is intended to allow the SAPS offices to enjoy a 'silent' listening mode until they are actually required by another station without being disturbed incessantly by other stations calling one another. This led to SAPS radios often being switched off or the volume turned too low to hear calls intended for them. The SAPS member on duty should, however, from time to time call into the local network to test the communications.

JOTA NEXT MONTH

We have been approached by Wayne Roberts, Commissioner for Scout Programmes in PE, to participate in this year's Jamboree On The Air, which is set down for the weekend 14/15 October.

He suggests, however, that we concern ourselves only with the Saturday (14th) between the hours 10h00 and about 15h00. Experience in the past has shown that interest among the scouts and guides wanes after the first few hours, especially in view of the relative sparsity of JOTA stations on the air in recent years.

In fact, for the last couple of years PEARS has not participated in JOTA because of the serious lack of enthusiasm among the youngsters for whom the event is actually organized. A lot of work goes into carting equipment to and from a selected JOTA site and erecting, operating and dismantling a station. Unless the scouts and guides show sufficient enthusiasm, the whole effort is a great disappointment.

This year, Wayne Roberts plans to whip

up some interest and suggests that we run two HF stations in Port Elizabeth as well as one each in Port Alfred and Grahamstown. He will ensure that the scouts and guides get involved in the operations, possibly even erecting poles for the antennas etc.

PEARS has agreed to participate again this year and, naturally, would like to hear urgently from volunteers among the hams in PE, PA and Grahamstown who are prepared to assist. Although we hope to run HF stations, VHF will also be used to advantage and ZRs can thus be of great assistance. Hams are also required to explain to the youngsters what ham radio is all about and what is happening during the QSOs.

TWO UNUSUAL BEAMS

Looking through my scrapbook I came across these sketches of two unusual but useful beam antennas for two metres. The first, which I call a "semi-beam", could find ready applications for flat-dwellers and others who have to hide their antennas in the attic. However, being more compact than its full-size counterpart, it could be equally convenient for the caravanner. The second antenna, which temporarily converts a J-pole into a beam, is clearly attractive to the latter and also to the 'stationary mobile' operator.

The Semi-beam

The most common antenna used by hams is a dipole one half-wavelength long at its operating frequency. We also use vertical antennas, however, which are only a quarter wavelength long. The matching half of the 'dipole' comes from an effective 'reflection' of the vertical element by the earth or ground-plane on which it is mounted.

In the semi-beam described here, the elements are only half as long as those normally used, and each is mounted on end on the metal boom. The missing halves of the elements are provided by the 'reflection' in the metal boom.

The boom and elements can be made of aluminium, although copper tubing for the driven element and gamma rod would facilitate soldering the ends of the shorting bar and connection of the capacitor to the rod.

Encase the capacitor in a plastic box or a container from a 35 mm film and seal the two points at which the wires between capacitor, SO239 and gamma rod enter the container. Similarly apply sealant around the lid or cover, which should be fitted after adjusting the trimmer capacitor and shorting bar for lowest SWR. Glue the container securely to the boom.




Fig. 1 - Construction of the 'semi-beam'

The PortaJay




Fig.2— Method for adding elements to temporarily convert a J-pole antenna into a beam.

Fig. 2 shows the construction of a beam that uses a J-pole antenna as the driven element. The J-pole can easily be attached to or removed from the rest of the assembly, converting it into a beam or restoring it to a standalone vertical antenna.

The wooden or plastic reel fitted to the J-pole should fit snugly into the cutout on the yoke that is attached to the wooden boom. Careful shaping of the cutout would allow the reel to 'snap' into the gap and remain there.

Alternatively, a stout rubber band could be stretched across the mouth of the yoke after the reel is in position (notches filed into both sides of the yoke would keep the rubber band from

slipping off). You can, of course, think of several other ways of securing the reel.

In use, the reflector and director elements are rotated around the J-pole to direct the antenna to the required station. The reel on the J-pole serves as the bearing on which the assembly rotates.

If the J-pole is to be used as a stand-alone antenna you could provide a fitting at the bottom of the unit to match whatever base you intend to use.

For mobile use, a *short* length from the shank of a 3/8" x 24 bolt would match the common ball mounts used by several makes of antenna, but note that *the antenna must not be fed via*

the ball mount!
There should, in fact, be no cable connected to the ball mount if one is used as a supporting device.

The antenna is fed via its own coaxial cable, which should be attached as indicated approximately 50 mm up from the bottom of the antenna.

The precise position must be determined by trial and error to obtain the lowest reading on your SWR meter.

CERTIFICATES OF ACHIEVEMENT

PEARS sponsors a number of certificates to recognise achievements in various facets of our hobby. Here are the basics

- VHF: On achieving a minimum of 50 points (derived from contacts with stations in various grid squares).
 Endorsements available for each additional 50 points up to a maximum of 200.
- 2. CW: Recognising two-way radiotelegraph contacts with fifty different stations. Endorsements for 100, 250 and 500 contacts. A new certificate will be issued for 1000 contacts.
- QRP: For establishing contacts with stations in twenty different grid squares on 5 watts or less. Endorsements for each additional twenty up to 100 grid squares.
- 4. Worked All Divisions: Contacts with stations in all ZS divisions 1 to 6 on 2m, 70cm or 23cm (single-band only).

For a full set of conditions, contact Beavan ZS2RL or any committee member.

PEARStalk

PIRATE ALERT

The SARL reported in a bulletin that they had received complaints about the use of fictitious amateur call signs on the air by three unlicensed individuals. Their HF Manager contacted the national societies in the three countries concerned and two confirmed that their telecommunications authorities had not issued the call signs.

The HF Manager also received an e-mail from the father of the third person (3DA0AT) who apologised for what had happened and stated that his son would not be active on HF again. His son is now in Trinidad. (The SARL report did not say whether the son holds any legal amateur callsign).

The other two call signs mentioned are not valid and are being used illegally. One is HP3PRB, whose name is Pieter and he is aboard the *Alchemy*. He is heard on 14,316 and 21,316 MHz.

The other, TI3HM, is Marlese on board *Telkentar* and the station is heard on 7,045 and 14,316 MHz.

The frequencies 7,045, 14,316 and 21,316 MHz have been adopted by the international yachting fraternity for exchanging weather reports with land stations (such as ZS5MU and ZS5GC in South Africa) and with one another as well as for general chitchat with other yachties on matters of common interest.

Unfortunately, these are not the first instances where yachties have adopted their own call signs and they will not be the last! Once they have been identified as illegal, your own licence is in jeopardy if you communicate with them, so be warned – do not engage in QSOs with these stations

VULGARITY ON PACKET

The Society's attention was drawn to a number of packet messages sent by a ZR6 licensee as open bulletins but actually intended as a response to a message placed earlier by a local member. They contained grossly vulgar and offensive comments.

After consideration at the August meeting, since the offending operator is not a member of PEARS, it was decided to pass copies of the messages to the SARL for their insight and attention. We expressed the view that the SARL should refer the matter to the Authorities (ICASA) with a recommendation that the ZR6's licence be cancelled. We asked the League to let us know the outcome.

Ham Radio does not need that kind of person in its midst.

The local operator's single message, although not entirely impeccable, called for only a light rap over the knuckles from the Society.

NEW PEARS AWARD

PEARS has agreed to a proposal by Mike Bosch ZS2FM to make available a certificate to be known as the "Worked All Divisions" award. It will be for VHF and UHF prowess: the applicant will have to provide proof of having worked at least one station in each of the RSA divisions 1 to 6 on two metres, 70 cm or 23 cm. All contacts must be two-way on the same band. Contacts on or after 1 January 2000 UTC are valid.

The award is available for members as well as non-members. Applications, with QSL cards confirming the contacts, must be directed to PEARS at the address on the front cover of QSX.

Mike has offered to present, out of his own pocket, the latest ARRL Handbook to the first operator to receive the award on each of the three bands. This offer, however, expires at the end of 2004.

BULLETINS ON THE LINK

It was decided recently to disconnect the 2 metre link at the east/west switch between George and Riversdal at 07h30 on Sundays. The three bulletins from Western Cape. Border and PEARS, plus the relays of the Afrikaans and English SARL bulletins, have occupied the linked repeater system for as much as two continuous hours every Sunday.

It was felt that the Western Cape hams are not especially interested in bulletins from our neck of the woods, and that similarly the Eastern Cape and Border users may not want to hear the Western Cape bulletin. Moreover, the BRC, with which PEARS has a greater community of interest, now starts its bulletins at 07h45 instead of 08h00.

Although we have members in the

Western Cape. all those who report in are active on HF and can access the 7098 kHz bulletin frequency, where conditions have again been good for some time.

The east/west switch can be restored, if required, when the PEARS after-bulletin net ends – usually around 09h30.

SCIFEST NEXT YEAR

We have been invited to participate again in the Science Festival in Grahamstown from 28 March to 3 April next year.

At the July meeting the members eagerly accepted the invitation. However, we do not want to again be accommodated down in the city, as we were this year, because it is not conducive to good communications.

We have been given to understand that the organisers will indeed accommodate us at the Monument, where we will be able to install antenna systems with a good take-off and demonstrate an interesting variety of amateur radio on-air activities.
