SA RADIO LEAGUE

As previously mentioned, no decision was taken on the proposed budget for the coming year of the League. Instead, there have been several meetings around the country at which ideas were thrashed out and they have been submitted to Headquarters

It seems that some of them sought the resignation of the President and the financial committee, and as a result the President, OM Syd Tyler ZS6AYC, has resigned. We do not know of others, but the motion actually needs to be approved at a special general meeting in order to take effect.

In the mean time, Hans Potgieter has taken over the reigns, which does not sound a good idea because of his past

attitude relating to how the League's funds need to be spent.

A special general meeting will take place in Johannesburg on 21 June, at which all proposals will, we expect, be finalized.

Ancestors - answer to May condundrum - Al Akers ZS2U

The answer could be calculated arithmetically, but is rather a tedious process. The maths boffins would no doubt recognise this as a geometric progression where:

$$S_n = a (r^n - 1) / r - 1$$

where S_n is the sum of all the terms (number of ancestors)

- a = the first term (2, mother and father)
- r = the ratio of one term to the next (2. Each step back doubles the number of ancestors for that step)
- n = the number of steps (9. Number of generations)

Thus we have:

$$S_n = 2 \times (2^9 - 1) / 2 - 1$$

= 1022 ancestors.

It is good to think that it took so many people so long to make you. Let's hope that they would have been satisfied with the result!

REPORT ON SPECIAL BUDGET MEETING BY CLUBS

On 17 May a Special Budget Meeting was held by club representatives at the NARC in Johannesburg. Hans Potgieter ZS6ALJ as acting President stepped in to chair the meeting. Six Councillors were present, and a total of ten clubs from Division 6 were represented at this meeting.

The meeting had input from the Cape Town meeting; input from a meeting held in Natal; as well as a proposed budget together with notes and proposals from East London.

Although the meeting was intended only to discuss the proposed new budget, discussions covered a wide range of issues.

The Treasurer, Bill ZS5KD, presented a draft budget based on a reduced ordinary fee of R300 pa. After a detailed discussion of individual budget items, it was recognized that the ordinary membership fee could not be set too low if the current activities of the League were to be properly financed. It was considered that the figure of R250 pa proposed by the Cape Town group was too low, as this would be much the same as the previous year's fees in real terms, and would not provide for any reduction of the accumulated deficit.

The figure of R275 proposed by East London could be made to work but would also restrict the operation of the League. The originally proposed fee of R330 pa was definitely too high, and would result in a substantial backlash from members. Similarly, the fee presented of R300 was considered too high, and would result in the loss of too many members

After much discussion, the members present agreed to recommend a subscription rate of R285 pa for ordinary members and affiliated clubs, and R60 for family members. It was further recommended that the gap between ordinary membership and senior / pensioner membership be eliminated, as the costs associated with providing services were identical.

It was recognized that this would have a negative effect on some retired members, and it was suggested that clubs could subsidise deserving cases. There is also provision for the SARL to subsidise these fees on an individual basis

The final recommendations by this meeting

to the SGM are as follows:

1. That annual subscription fees be set as follows:

1.2 Family members – R60;

1.3 Overseas members - R600.

- 2. The Treasurer is tasked to develop a budget based on the proposed fees, using a maximum membership of 1 150 and with the requirement that a minimum of 35% of the total deficit at the end of this financial year be liquidated. Costs would therefore have to be adjusted to achieve that result.
- Council should pay serious attention to control of expenditure to ensure that cost overruns such as that experienced over the last year do not recur.
- Council should ensure that expenditure during the early part of the new financial year is restricted on a conservative basis until membership numbers for the year have materialized and are understood.
- The treasurer should provide summary reports of membership, income and expenditure, preferably on a monthly basis.
- All members present and participating in this recommendation should publicly support it within their clubs, and attempt to provide explanations where these are required.
- 7. It was recognized that the setting of subscription fees and the budget was only part of the whole picture. There was a real concern that members do not feel they are obtaining value for money from their membership. It was clear that work needed to be done to solve this more basic problem in the future.

Remember, the Special General Meeting at which the new budget must be presented, discussed, amended and accepted, has been convened for 21 June at the NARC.

COMPARING SARL SUBSCRIPTIONS

Whilst looking through some old Radio ZS's the other day, I found a 1969 issue in which the subscriptions for membership of the SARL were listed. I was amazed to see that the ordinary annual membership fee was shown at R4.75c for the year.

In 1969, I was earning the sum of R300 per month, so I worked out that the annual subs to the SARL were approximately 1,5 % of a monthly salary.

I have no idea what monthly salaries are like in this day and age, but in this area of Plettenberg Bay, not many youngsters earn over R3 000 a month. But let us say a youngster starting out in commerce in Port Elizabeth, as I was in 1969, is earning say R5000 a month. Based on the 1969 percentage, he or she should be paying annual subs to the SARL of R75 a year.

One thing that must be remembered is that in 1969 and right up to the time that the League was moved from Cape Town up to Gauteng, the people who ran the League did so for the love of the hobby and felt it an honour and a priviledge to give freely of their time to the amateur fraternity. Unfortunately, this is not so today.

What is needed is for the League either to be disbanded or for a new organisation to offer membership at a realistic level of, say, R100 per annum, and reinstitute the branch system with the new Radio Society. The branch system worked and it worked well.

I would also go as far as to say that once a new organisation comes into

being, without perks and salaries, that membership of the Radio Society of South Africa becomes compulsory for all amateurs. Once this happens, subs could be dropped to the R75 per member level giving the new Society an income of plus minus R375 000. Here's hoping.

[I cannot remember subs being as low as R4,75 a year. Are you sure it was for annual membership, Rog? Something like R16 seems correct at that time.

When the League was in Cape Town, all councillors resided close by. Many worked in Cape Town and some were able to go to the SARL office, which was right in town, during lunch or after work and do their bit. There was a paid office lady, but several members volunteered their time too.

Radio ZS was done without any editorial cost, and we enjoyed twelve copies every year. The QSL Bureau also operated without loss. While most of our current councillors work on a volunteer basis, some are paid at least for some of their work.

One of our major problems was the imprudent attempt to take over the functions from ICASA. Everything we do on ICASAs behalf is done at great cost, either to the League or to the applicant. No wonder newcomers find there is not enough cash left to join the League, while the considerably enhanced subscriptions deter many older ones in this day and age.

As far as compulsory membership is concerned, I would object. The radio society must make me want to be part of it so that we will all volunteer to join. – Ed.]

MICROWAVE & DIGITAL CONTEST RULES CHANGE

The PEARS contest rules published in last month's QSX have been amended:—In **Categories**, below (1) Terrestrial, add **(2) EME – CW/FM/SSB**.

Under **Reports and Scoring**, EME stations are permitted to work any local **or DX** station via the moon, but the distance claimed shall be the grid square to grid square distance. Under **Microwave Stations**, insert **or CW** after **analogue**.

The full rules have been published on our website as well as that of the SA Radio League. \square

REV COUNTER / TACHOMETER FOR OLDER TOW CARS

More often than not, the older cars used by caravanners for towing have no rev counters to indicate when peak torque revolutions are reached whilst towing. I found this circuit in an 1976 ETI magazine. Kinda suits the cars we are talking about

Using the versatile NE555V timer, which has the ability to sink 200mA at 4.5 to 18v, a very accurate rev counter can easily be built on a bit of 0,1 pitch veroboard.

Pulses from the points are fed to a 1k resistor and a 5v zener for clamping and then trigger pin 2, which causes the output to go high on pin 3 for a duration set by the R/C ratio on pins 6 & 7.

During this time the 1N4148 on pin 3 is reversed biased, and the 4.7k resistor and the preset supply a constant current to the meter, which is calibrated in Rev/Min. The meter gives an analogue representation. When the time duration lapses, pin 3 goes low, shunting all current around the meter.

The ratio of current flow to the time


it is shunted gives a representation of RPM, which is integrated, (or smoothed) by the meters mechanical movement, to give a very accurate indication, when calibrated, of the RPM.

Accuracy is nominally to 2%.

The 9v zener, 15 ohm resistor and $10~\mu\text{F}$ capacitor are to stabilize the current supply to the meter.

Calibration can be made using 50Hz 12v pulses derived from the domestic mains if it is remembered that the points operate at 2 times the engine RPM on a 4 cylinder engine, i.e. 50Hz = 3000 cycles per min for a 4 cylinder 4 stroke engine. On a 6 cylinder it's 1125 RPM.

The 555 IC gives temperature stability and solid state reliability.

CONGRATS TO CONTEST CHAPS

We find a couple of our members mentioned in the results of the PEARS VHF/UHF contest in January. Congrats to André and Garth for the longest distances on 432 MHz, having worked ZR2GB and ZS2KW. Then ZR2GJ/1 and ZS2AZR/1 won the Region One field station category on 144 MHz, while Ken ZS2BWB was second in both the 50 MHz fixed and 432 MHz fixed station categories.

SARL KID'S DAY

The next SARL Kid's Day will be on the air on Youth Day, Monday 16 June 2003. The activity will run from 09:00 to 11:00 SAST on the 20, 40 and 2 metre bands.

The aim of the Kid's Day is to encourage young people (licensed or not) to enjoy amateur radio. It can give young people hands-on, on-the-air

experience so they might develop an interest in pursuing a licence in the future.

Because the Comrades Marathon is being run the same day, the exchange will be name, age, location and favourite sportsman or sportswomen.

Operators are encouraged to allow the young people to talk to other young people around the country – do not limit it just to the exchange.

Show the young people some of the other modes of operating such as CW, SSTV, packet, PSK31, etc.

SARL PRESIDENT RESIGNS

At the opening of the special budget meeting which was held recently at the NARC, Vice President of the SARL, Hans Potgieter, ZS6ALJ, announced that Sid Tyler, ZS6AYC, resigned as President of the SARL as from 15 May.

Hans Potgieter will thus be at the helm of the SARL until the council meeting that will be held after the Special General Meeting on 21 June 2003. This meeting will deal with the amended budget for 2003/2004.

A new President will be elected during that council meeting.

136 kHz BAND CONTACT

The first GM to YU contact on the 136 kHz band has been reported. Simon Lewis GM4PLM completed the first Scotland to Yugoslavia LF contact

at 22:28 UTC on 20 April. Simon had a two-way contact with Teo YU7AR on 137.7 kHz.

Simon was using equipment left behind by David Bowman G0MRF, when the UK 73 kHz record was broken.

EAST TIMOR OFF THE AIR

The ITU's prefix assignment 4WA–4WZ was intended for the use of United Nations Temporary Administration of East Timor (UNTAET) as long as it existed, and was to be released to the ITU at the end of its existence.

The UNTAET organization's charter in East Timor expired on 20 May, 2002, and all ham radio operating authority also expired on that date.

The East Timor government is expected to take over responsibility for ham radio licensing, but for the time being it appears that East Timor is off the air.

For DXCC purposes, UN Temporary Administration of East Timor was added to the DXCC List with the effective date of 1 March 2000

ALL 6 ZS DIVISIONS ON 2 m

Congratulations to ZS4NS, who might be the first ZS station to work all divisions on 2 m. The final contact was established with ZR1AEE on Tuesday at 20:20.

The SARL would like to know whether this achievement is indeed the first station to have worked all ZS divisions on 2 m.

EXTRAORDINARY 40m QSO

On Saturday, 3 May 2003, Nico ZS2N (Aliwal North) and Johan ZS1I (Mossel Bay) established an unscheduled contact on 7 050 kHz at 15:30.

After 30 minutes of talking they were joined by Stefan ZS3S (Carnarvon), Herman ZS6HLJ (Carletonville), Nico

ZS4NE (Bloemfontein), Pieter ZS4PB (Vryburg) and David ZS1LDH (Cape Town).

It was discovered that a Division 5 station was needed to ensure a QSO of all divisions. Vic ZS5UN from Hillcrest joined shortly afterwards which resulted in the establishment of a contact between all divisions in the country, purely by coincidence.

NEW IRLP LINK ACTIVATED IN PRETORIA

The Quantum Amateur Radio Club is commissioning a new IRLP link in Pretoria. The node is in the final testing stage and hams are encouraged to try it.

70 MHz/4m ACTIVITY IN PRETORIA

In the Pretoria area, there is quite an amount of activity on the recently allocated 70 MHz, or 4 m band. There are quite regular QSO's on 70,200 MHz in the evenings.

On Sundays at 10:00, ARMI and the Magalies Radio Amateur Club's bulletin at 11:15 are being relayed on 70,200 MHz by Pieter ZS6PVW. These relays have already been heard in Randburg and as far as Cullinan.

Please remember that if you hear strangers on the band, they have preference, since the 4 m band is allocated to us on a secondary basis.

[I don't believe anybody was told that the band had now been handed to us. Previously only a small segment was allocated.— Ed]

DXPEDITION TO SWAZILAND

Rad ZS6RAD, Ron ZS5ABD, Cliff ZS6BOX, Nigel 3DA0NG and Willie ZS5WI will be operating from Ezulwini, Swaziland from 29th July to 3rd August 2003. They will be joined by Willie 3DA0BD and Andy 3DA0TM as time permits

Activity will be on most bands – possibly including VHF – probably using phone, CW, WSJT and RTTY from 03h00 to 07h00 and from 14h00 to 22h00 UTC daily.

They will be participating as a multioperator station during the SARL phone contest.

LOGBOOK OF THE WORLD

The long-anticipated "Logbook of the World" (LoTW) – the ARRL's secure electronic contact-confirmation system – is being opened for beta testing.

At the heart of the Logbook of the World concept is a huge repository of log data provided by operators – from individual DXers and contesters to major DXpeditions – and maintained by the ARRL.

The system will provide quick QSO credit for awards offered by the ARRL – and, it's hoped, those offered by other organizations as well – without having to first collect and submit hard-copy QSL cards.

It is not the intention to replace the whole paper QSL scheme with Logbook of the World. This is really a system to

offer credits for awards.
