January certainly made up for it, especially the portable operation.


Then the Radio Technology in Action day came along and it was really great to see 35 of our members attending.

FINE-TUNING MODIFICATION for the ZR TO ZS HF RECEIVER

A modification for the ZR to ZS HF Receiver (which appeared in the December 2005 issue of QSX) with regard to fine tuning was imminent: the resolution of SSB and CW (single sideband and continuous wave) signals was difficult to tune because of the relatively coarse frequency-control provided by the potentiometer (R8) used as the main tuner, as indicated in the attached diagram. (Diagram 1)


When connected as shown in Diagram 2 the very effective fine tuning control so produced really takes the sting out of resolving SSB signals, and the winkling out of CW signals.

To do this, first make the fine tuner

control by soldering the 470 ohm resistor across the two outer tags of the 1K linear potentiometer, then solder to it two short lengths of PVC-covered wire, one to an outer tag and one bridging the center tag to the other outer tag.


Now de-solder the wire that is currently soldered to R8 Gnd on the PCB. Solder this wire now to one of the outer tag wires of the 1K linear potentiometer and the other wire from the outer tag of the 1K pot to the hole indicated on the PCB as R8 Gnd. That's it, you now have a fine tuner for the receiver.

The simple and low cost modification shown in Diagram 2 remedies the problem, by adding a low value variable resistor in series with the main tuning

potentiometer to act as a fine tuner. A 1K linear potentiometer with a 470 ohm fixed resistor. connected directly in parallel, effectivelv makes а variable resistor whose value changes from a few ohms to about 320 ohms as the spindle is rotated.



History of Phonetic Alphabets

The phonetic alphabet, or commonly dubbed the NATO phonetic alphabet, is universal not only for radio but wherever it can aid verbal communications.

During World War 1 phonetics were used on the western front based on Air Force slang, like Ack, Beer, Charlie, Don, while during that same conflict the British Royal Navy used Apples, Butter, Charlie, Duff.

However the first internationally recognised alphabet was adopted by the International Telecommunications Union in 1927, it underwent subsequent changes until 1932 when a set of mainly place names were adopted including Amsterdam, Baltimore, Casablanca and Denmark.

During World War 2, due to allied operational requirements, the Army/Navy alphabet was introduced, consisting of a group of words such as Able, Baker, Charlie, Dog, and one of them, Roger, still lingers today, despite being replaced with Romeo.

Different alphabets were used by the Royal Air Force. Alfa, Bravo, Coca, Delta is one example.

Post war when the aviators entered or re-entered civil aviation there was confusion, particularly with air traffic controllers in non-English speaking Latin America. In recognition of the value of using phonetics, efforts were made to come up with a set that was internationally usable and worked well under poor receiving conditions.

The International Civil Aviation Organisation devised a new alphabet in 1956 that was adopted shortly after by the International Telecommunications Union, appearing in the radio regulations of 1959. The alphabet also includes phonetics for numerals, such as fife for five and niner for nine.

And how did it get dubbed the NATO alphabetic? Well, NATO is the acronym for the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation. The alphabet was used for joint naval activities of the NATO and United States and, to differentiate from what existed previously, it was referred to as the NATO alphabet.

Well, the "set that was internationally usable and worked well under poor receiving conditions", according to the ICAO, has proved in my case to be utterly useless. Whenever I give my callsign as ZS2 Hotel Bravo, with correct pronunciation. the distant operator receives it as Echo Bravo. I've noticed this also with other stations using Hotel in their callsigns. I now simply use Henry which everyone understands Baker. immediately.

There is something wrong with a system that has a number of words with syllables that sound similar in poor conditions, e.g. Alfa, Delta, and Sierra; Bravo and Echo; even Echo and Hotel! And there is also Sierra as opposed to Zero.

Even with the recommended pronunciation, there is always the problem of different home languages spoken by pilots – and of course hams.

Perhaps it is time for ICAO and the ITU to have a fresh look at their phonetic alphabet. Ω

Welcome:

The Chairman Rory ZS2BL welcomed everyone who had made the effort to attend the meeting. Greetings and best wishes were passed on from SARL President Graham Hartlett ZS6GJH, Bud ZS1B and the Bloemfontein ARC (via email from Dennis ZS4BS). A special thanks was extended to those who had come from out of town.

Present and Apologies:

Acceptance of Previous AGM Minutes:

Proposed: ZS2VM; Seconded: ZR2VDL.

Matters Arising:

Finance:

The Treasurer's report was presented by Rory ZS2BL in Clive ZS2RT's absence. Ken ZS2BWB commented that repeaters are a large expense, but are scarcely used by members but are more used by visitors and non-members. Chris ZS2AAW agreed with Ken that this is the situation. He did however point out that the high costs are as a result of expansions to the system around the George/Knysna area. Next year should see a drop in expenses. The day's expedition to Cockscomb and recent activities by the Mountain Club is however promising.

Viv ZS2VM stated that the only two worthwhile things upon which money is spent are QSX and the repeaters. Ken ZS2BWB suggested that we look at ways of enhancing the features of the system.. Terence ZR2VDL mentioned that as the system is available for emergency use we should try to encourage it's usage therefore.

John ZS2J expressed his concern at the sad lack of support for ZRs. He feels that we should have a subcommittee to assist fellow hams. John also felt that we should look to using funds to obtain a clubhouse. John also

queried the RAE expenses and Slipper Site expenses. This was clarified by Rory ZS2BL and Chris ZS2AAW. Chris ZS2AAW added that the Mountain Club members are desperate for help with practical operation.

Gus ZS2MC suggested looking at changing our bank account to a cheque account to reduce fees. Terence ZR2VDL suggested negotiating with our bank. He also suggested internet banking as an alternative. It was agreed that the new committee would look into this. Terence said that he would be available for assistance.

The acceptance of the financial report was proposed by Ken ZS2BWB and seconded by Colin ZS2AO.

Certificates from the South Cape ARC were presented to PEARS as well as to Chris ZS2AAW and Trevor ZS2AE.

General:

Ken ZS2BWB proposed that the Society propose Al ZS2U for Honorary Life Membership of the SARL. This was unanimously agreed to by the meeting.

Ken ZS2BWB stated that several members had expressed concern over the future of the society, and what has been done by the committee. The new committee needs to decide on the future of the society, and members should get behind and support the committee.

Gus ZS2MC proposed a vote of thanks to the outgoing committee. This was seconded by A1 ZS2U.

Fred ZS2JS thanked the bulletin readers for their efforts during the past year.

Chris ZS2AAW explained the happenings at the Cockscomb repeater site from earlier in the day.

SARL AGM WELL ATTENDED

The AGM held in Durban recently was well attended with two hundred and eighteen members represented in person and by proxy.

Colin de Villiers, ZS6COL, presented some interesting facts. Currently the SARL has 1 280 members, which are 100 more than last year. Division 6 has 51% of the membership, Division 1 19,3%, Division 2 7%, Division 3 0,9%, Division 4 1%, Division 5 12,7%.

In his annual report SARL President Graham Hartlett, ZS6GJH, said he was optimistic about the growth but urged non-members to take up membership. He said it is about *representation* and not just numbers. We need to encourage more young people to join amateur radio too

The SARL is now entering a growth period with Councillors having to focus on specific projects supported by the membership in the form of the Divisional

advisers. We need to improve the marketing of amateur radio and the SARL.

Graham said his vision for the future is to get new people into amateur radio, to get more people nominated for council and an active voting process. "We should see competition for the presidency", he said.

Radio amateurs should support their local clubs as they supply much of the repeater infrastructure.

He thanked all who supported the SARL during the past year. He highlighted the Kopanang project, which is a partnership by the Department of Communication and the SARL, aimed at bringing young people into Amateur Radio. Currently over 150 learners are involved in the project.

He appealed to clubs and individual members to offer their services. Ω

The following councillors were elected at the SARL AGM: Dennis Green, ZS4BS, Derek Gravett, ZS5Y, Graham Hartlett, ZS6GJH, Henry Chamberlain, ZS1AAZ, Rassie Erasmus, ZS1YT, Ivan Newman, ZR6LN, Deon Erwin, ZS1ZL, Hans van de Groenendaal, ZS6AKV. Pine Pienaar ZS6OB was co-opted to Council.

Graham, ZS6GJH, was re-elected as President and Rassie, ZS1YT, as Vice President. Our congratulations go to both, as well as all the other members of Council.

At the SARL AGM, it was proposed and agreed that the HAMNET simulated emergency contest date will change to the first week in March.

Tjerk Lammers, ZS6P, raised the issue of preserving call signs of silent keys, which are currently being preserved for 5 years. He proposed that it be changed to one year. Lively discussion followed at the AGM and it was agreed that the call sign becomes available one year after the year of the call sign expiry.

ZS5WI, Willy, proposed that Amateur

Radio should not be referred to as a hobby but as the ITU designation of "the Amateur Service". This was carried.

ZS5NK, Gary, proposed that the field day date be changed to the same date as the IARU field day and this was agreed.

Rod, ZS6RK, proposed that the preferred designation should be radio amateur and not the word hams. This was carried [but it seems he and most others were unaware of the fact that use of the term "ham radio" was nevertheless supported by the IARU council – we were informed of this in an address by an IARU councillor on ARMI some time ago. There is nothing wrong with the term Ham Radio, he said!]

SARL FEES FOR 2006/2007

Fees for SARL membership will be as follows for the 2006/2007 year: Ordinary membership will go up by 5% to R305, but Pensioner membership will remain the same at R230.

The club affiliation fee is also increased to R305, but all other categories will remain the same as last year.

HAM RADIO MODULE FOR ZASAT DELIVERED

SA AMSAT has delivered the first prototype interface to power the amateur radio operation on the second South African satellite to be launched in December.

Andrew Roos, ZS6AAA, and Hannes Coetzee, ZS6BZP, designed, built and tested the prototype. The unit will now be evaluated by the University of Stellenbosch team.

A duplicate prototype is currently being tested and, if all goes to plan, it will be demonstrated at the Western Cape RTA on 13 May.

etiquette, special characters, links to online dictionaries and more.

Site author Steve, M0ECS, said: "This really is a work of mutual cooperation in the true spirit of amateur radio. Over a dozen amateurs from eight countries worked together to produce the language files."

SARL TO BE ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN TESTING FOR PLC INTERFERENCE

It was agreed that the SARL will be working with other working group members to develop test methods to be used to determine the effects, if any, of PLC on the radio spectrum.

The STANSA TC73 Working Group 6 is tasked with electro-magnetic compatibility in telecommunication. The group will also prepare a memorandum to ICASA to propose regulation of trial and pilot studies. Radio amateurs are requested to keep an eye out for PLC reports in local newspapers and fax cuttings to ZS6AKV at 012 991 5651.

SARL TAKES PART IN PREPARATION INITIATIVE

The Department of Communications recently launched the South African World Radio Conference Committee to prepare the South African delegation for WRC 2007.

The South African Radio League was represented by President Graham Hartlett, ZS6GJH, and Hans van de Groenendaal, ZS6AKV.

Two main issues affect amateur radio: a harmonised world-wide secondary allocation of 135,7 – 137,8 kHz and expansion of the 40 metre band to 7 300 kHz. ZS6AKV is the rapporteur for the ultra low band allocation while the SARL representatives will participate in the 4 – 10 MHz working group meetings to look after the amateur interests.
