A few months ago now we had PEARS first VHF fox hunt and it really was a great amount of fun. There were 10 active participants but many more that came for the social side of things and a great time was had by all. Gert and his brother Marais did an outstanding job of presenting it, and as a result we have decided we will host another

one soon. I think the agreement is that the winner of the previous event hides the fox on the next event, so we may ask ZR2BK to decide on a date too. Maybe somewhere in September. South African Radio League Amateur Radio Hall of Fame



Iris Hayes ZS2AA Inducted in 2016

Iris was born in Queenstown in October 1903 the granddaughter of a former Lieutenant-Governor of Kaffraria. She qualified as a nurse and married Samuel Hayes. They farmed at Whittlesea near Queenstown. Sammy died in 1973. Iris suffered a stroke which confined her to bed, shortly after her 95th birthday. She died in May 1999.

Iris developed an interest in amateur radio after hearing radio amateurs conversing on her radiogram. She was licenced in 1937, the first female radio amateur in South Africa. She set up a large station on the farm, using rhombic antennas. She started with a $2\frac{1}{2}$ W transmitter, which later grew to 10 and 50 W, allowing her to work 97 countries.

On the 2nd June, 1952, the S.A. Women's Radio Club came into being, with Iris Hayes, ZS2AA, as Organizing President, Muriel Neill ZS5KG, Vice-President Marie Cormack ZS6KK, Diana Green ZS6GH, as organising Secretary, the subscription being the magnif-icent sum of 50 cents. On formation, 33 ladies joined and by the end of 1952, the club had 71 members, consisting of YL amateurs and interested listeners.

Iris was also an ardent member of the World Association of Christian Radio Amateurs and Listeners (WACRAL).

Iris was the Chairman of the Whittlesea branch of the Red Cross for 23 years. During the Second World War, she was a Commandant of the SA Women's Auxiliary Association.

She was the President of the Young Ladies' Radio League (YLRL) in 1950. Iris earned a Worked All ZS certificate in 1962.

During 1981, she spent three months in the USA and Canada, mostly being met at the airport by her radio amateur hosts.

In March 1994, she was the keynote speaker at the SARL AGM in Port Elizabeth, and presented the SARL awards at the Awards Dinner.

Iris was awarded the SARL Honorary Life membership in 1985

In 1996, she was unanimously elected as Honorary Life President of the Border Radio Club.

To put the S.A. Woman's Radio Club on the map, the club is-sued two Certificates, the W.A.Y.L. (Worked All YL), the rules being drafted in Division 1 with the help of Iris Hayes, ZS2AA, in 1955, and the K.K.K. (Key Keen Klub) being suggest-ed by Gwen Smith, ZS1NQ).



To obtain the W.A.Y.L. Certificate, amateurs must work 12 LYLs in Southern Africa, south of the former Belgian Congo from the 2nd June, 1952, submitting QSLs and enclosing a remittance of 25 cents. For the K.K.K. Certificate, copies of Logs must be sent duly certified for 100 C.W. contacts, 500 or 1000, together with 50 cents. Contacts must be made from the 31 December, 1956. Certificates were free to SAWRC members.

SOUTHERN AFRICAN H.F. CENTURY AWARD

This award is available to all amateur radio operators for contacts made since 1st January 2004. The aim is to contact Maidenhead grid locators on the African mainland South of the Equator on the nine high frequency amateur bands. Score one point per grid locator on each of these bands. Only one contact per grid locator is eligible. Total points is the sum of points on each band.

There are three categories for the award: Bronze Award: Score at least 100 points in 5 different countries. Silver Award: Score at least 200 points in 10 different countries Gold Award: Score at least 300 points in 15 different countries. All contacts must be made from within a radius of 25 kilometres. Contacts must be confirmed either by QSL cards or by other means acceptable to the awards committee, such as electronic means. Decisions made by the awards committee shall be final.

PEARS QRP Certificate

20 different maidenhead locator contacts. Power <=5W. Endorsements for each additional 20 contacts up to a max of 100. Contacts within same home square do not count. Only one contact per station. Logs must indicate the home square, and the other contacts' locations. Logs must be signed by the chairman of the applicant's club, or two other amateurs. The recipient need not be a member of PEARS.

TROPODUCTING

- GETTING OUT BEYOND THE HORIZON

Tropoducting, also known as tropospheric ducting or simply ducting, refers to a phenomenon in which radio waves are guided or trapped within a duct formed in the Earth's lower atmosphere, known as the troposphere. This ducting effect can significantly enhance the propagation of radio signals over long distances, beyond what would normally be possible due to the curvature of the Earth.

Several meteorological factors contribute to the creation of tropospheric ducts, including temperature inversions, humidity, and atmospheric pressure. Temperature inversions occur when a layer of warm air is sandwiched between colder air masses, effectively trapping the radio waves within the duct. Humidity and pressure also affect the index of refraction, influencing the bending of radio waves and allowing them to propagate through the duct rather than escaping.

Now, imagine that under certain atmospheric conditions, such as the presence of a temperature inversion or an atmospheric pressure gradient, a duct is formed within the troposphere. This duct acts as a waveguide, allowing radio waves to propagate along its path rather than following the curvature of the Earth.


When radio waves encounter a tropospheric duct, they can be refracted or trapped within it, allowing them to travel over much longer distances than they would in normal atmospheric conditions. This effect is especially notable in the VHF (Very High Frequency) and UHF (Ultra High Frequency) bands, typically used by television and radio stations.

In the summer months Tropospheric ducting is common at the coast and it is often possible to work the East London repeater on a Watt or less. The East London repeater is on 145.650 - just like our "town" repeater, except that no tones are needed to open the East London repeater, while a tone is required to open our local repeater. To see if you are hitting the East London repeater, simply REMOVE the tone from your radio and operate "650" as normal. If you hear a tail coming back - or some other radio hams coming back to you you know it is not our town repeater, so quess what - you hitting the East London repeater!

I remember on warm evening, well after 21:30, having a long chat to Andre ZS2ZA (who at the time stayed a few Kms down the road from my QTH). We were using

the East London repeater and both operating 0.5W. At times we were joined by others in East London - often Lunga ZS2LN. I talk of operatinig VHF into East London like that is a feat - but on less than a single Watt, I think it is special. Tropoducting with some power will get you into KwaZulu Natal or down as far as Still Baai or even Cape Agulas.

Where can you find out about tropoducting-favourable conditions? https://www.dxinfocentre.com/tropo_ino.html. The Hepburn charts give pictures indicating the likelihood of tropospheric ducting in a near-live forecast. Go to the link above, find the drop-down box for region and select South Africa.



The "hotter" the more likely the conditions are favourable for tropoducting. This was a great opportunity in 2022, but conditions like these are common in the warmer months here in Port Elizabeth.

Tropoducting is very interesting from an academic perspective, but in reality it is a lot of fun!



From the JAMTIN

The Jamtin and its various antennae continue to provide good DXing. Friday evenings on 10m, 15m, 40m, 80m give varying results.

40m has been quiet on the DX side of things until some Fridays ago I picked up ZS1PZ speaking to a group of hams in the USA. Most of them were a bit to far down in the noise but one, N7EKD, was a bit clearer than the rest. After a while ZS1PZ asked if any other ZS hams would like to try a QSO with N7EKD. I grabbed my mike and accepted the offer. Pretty soon I was chatting to Frank in Oregon. That was my second QSO into the USA from the Jamtin, my previous one being to a ham in Nebraska.

That same evening, I spoke to RN1B in St Petersburg. Once he turned his antenna a bit more South he came through 5/9+++.

DL4EEC, Alex in Hamburg, was also looking south and he came through 5/9++ as well.

Very often I hear USA hams 5/9 but can't get through to them. They are pointing towards Europe and running high power rigs. Hence their TX floods down to ZS. If I call the ham in the USA sometimes the ham in Europe will respond and turn his antenna more south.

Waiting for ZS2CJ, Chad who is now in Belgium to get his rigs sorted out so we can get some comms going there.

At the last AGM it was decided to move the monthly meeting to the Scout Hall. This is great news for the Jamtin as there are plans to open

the Jamtin early on meeting night so members can play radio. I have an ICOM 7300 which members are welcome to use. You are also welcome to bring your own radios to test or operate.


There will also be a soldering station available should you wish to make up some coax or work on a project.
